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
DATA SPOTLIGHT: FIRST-YEAR EXPERIENCE RESEARCH

Planning and Institutional Research has partnered with the Office of First Year Programs at NKU and graduate students in the MSIO capstone course to design the First-Year Transitions survey. This survey gathers student feedback on the NKU experience, including needs for counseling, food, or housing. Based upon responses, students are then connected with support offices on campus to ensure they can remain successful.

The First-Year Student Experience Committee and PIR designed the first iteration of the survey which launched this past fall. Graduate students in the MSIO capstone course interviewed first-year students this spring, and used findings from these interviews to create additional survey items on a Likert scale. The MSIO students administered the spring iteration of the survey, and produced an analysis of survey results to present to the Committee.

Some highlights from this research involve students' worries regarding writing support and their feelings towards their overall mental wellbeing (see below). Student responses from the fall survey were compared to their spring responses showing significant changes in these two items.

Writing Worries Fade Over Time: Many students who said they needed writing support in the fall no longer felt they needed help by spring. Fall Mean 1.58 Spring Mean 1.25



Mental Health Concerns on the Rise:

A growing number of students who weren't initially worried about their mental wellbeing in the fall reported concerns by spring. Amanda Andrews, Director & Lecturer with First-Year Experience and Programming, is excited to see how this research can impact student success at NKU, noting that:

"The work done with PIR through the Transition Survey and in collaboration with MSIO Capstone, led by Phil Moberg, will provide us with information on the needs of students as they move through the entire first year of their time at NKU. This will also give students access to resources if they state a need within the survey, allowing us to provide intervention before the student falls into the risk of dropping out. This level of care will enable students to see that the university is here for them from the first day they step on campus and that the support doesn't drop mid-semester; instead, it catches needs and connects with individuals on campus to help address their needs they have. "

Dr. Phil Moberg, Director, Graduate Program in Industrial & Organizational Psychology, provided more background on the MSIO program and how this particular project intersects with students' coursework:

"The graduate program in Industrial and Organizational (IO) psychology at NKU provides a capstone seminar in the final semester to enable graduates to apply their newly acquired competencies to real world projects having implications for organizations and their clients. Training in IO psychology combines rigorous methods from psychological science with findings from organizational behavior, and quantitative approaches of statistics to investigate, intervene, and generate empirical evidence that can guide organizational decision-making.


In collaborating with the Office of First Year Programs at NKU, our goals have been fourfold: to collect data and apply principles of psychological measurement to determine if the existing first-year needs survey (a) is interpreted uniformly by respondents, (b) assesses student needs validly and reliably, and (c) produces meaningful evidence to guide decision-making. In addition, graduate students applied their training in psychometrics and scientific survey research design to construct a new measure to explicitly assess the specific needs of first-year students."




Assessment Pro Tip:

Tell the Story Behind the Data - Don't Just Report the Numbers

When evaluating progress and completing the *Analysis of Findings* in WEAVE, go beyond listing results. Focus on **why** you met or didn't meet the target. Highlight trends, context, and contributing factors.

- Interpret the results What do they mean? Why did this happen?
- . Connect it to action What's next? What worked? What needs improvement?



Pro Tip Bonus: Actions for Improvements -Turn Insight Into Impact

By including Actions for Improvement in your Analysis of Findings, your WEAVE entry becomes a strategic narrative - not just a compliance task. You're showing that assessment is driving meaningful change.

- Celebrate and scale what worked well.
- Identify gaps and propose solutions.
- **Prioritize:** Not all issues need immediate action, but note what will be addressed now vs. later.
- Be **realistic and specific** in your action plans (e.g., timeline, responsible party, resource needs).

Significant Decline in Student Debt At Graduation

According to the Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE), the average federal and private loan balance for undergraduate completers at NKU has decreased by 36% since 2018–19. In 2018–19, the average loan balance was \$24,622, compared to \$15,677 in 2023–24.
