Five Ways to Prepare for Career Fairs

Update your resume. Your resume is what you leave behind for employers to remember you by. Let the experts at Career Services help you present the best version of your resume. You have put in the work; make sure the employers know it! You want to stand out from the rest, and your resume can help you do that.

Have an elevator speech. Being prepared when going up to a table will help to boost your confidence. One way to be prepared is by having a basic outline of what you are going to say already prepared. Think about your experience and skills that will apply to your field. With that in mind, create a 1-2 minute outline of what you can say about yourself.

Dress for success. Look the part when you are at a career fair. Think of it as an interview. You can still show off your own personal flare, but make sure that you are still within the lines of professional attire. Find your "power outfit," something that you feel confident in because that confidence will show.

Be ready to ask questions. This event is not just for employers to get to know you, it is also for you to get to know them. Think of some questions beforehand. What things are important to you: training, social environment, ability to advance, etc.? This will show the employer that you are interested and that you have put thought into what you want.

Schedule a mock interview. Be ready for anything that the employer throws your way. Peer Career Assistants in Career Services can work with you to better your techniques. Practicing for an interview will make you feel more comfortable when you are talking with employers. This would also be a great time to practice asking the questions that you will ask the employers or your elevator speech.
