General Education Frequently Asked Questions

NOTE: This checklist and curriculum applies only to Honors College students admitted as degree seeking students to NKU in the Fall 2018 semester or later.

1. Do Honors College students complete the top or bottom portion of this checklist?

- All Honors College students who begin at NKU as first time, first year, degree-seeking students (students who recently completed high school) are required to complete the Foundation (HNR 101 and HNR 102) and their choice of one of the three cohorts (Natural World, Society, or Humanity) as shown at the top of the checklist. Students complete the remaining general education categories using the traditional course choices shown at the bottom of the checklist. All first time, first year Honors College students must complete HNR 101 and 102 regardless of any college credit through AP/IB/School Based Scholars/etc.
- Students admitted as transfer students from other institutions or continuing students later in their NKU career should contact the Honors College for advice on the appropriate honors pathway.

2. Can honors and non-honors courses mix to fulfill a general education category?

No. An individual honors course does *not* fulfill any general education requirements. For instance, HNR 101 by itself fulfills no general education requirement. The completed block of HNR 101 and HNR 102 fulfills the entire block of general education "Communication" requirements. Likewise, HNR 320 completes no general education requirements, but the block of HNR 220, 320, and 321 fulfills the entire block of "Self & Society" requirements. This works likewise for the Natural World and Humanity cohorts.

3. In addition to half of the general education requirements, what other benefits does the Honors College curriculum provide?

• The Honors College curriculum provides students with a traditional liberal arts curriculum designed for the 21st century world by focusing on interdisciplinary perspectives, community applications, and engaged citizenship. The curriculum includes the Foundation (HNR 101 & HNR 102), one Cohort (HNR 2x0, 3x0, and 3x1), one honors elective or study abroad, and a senior capstone project. In addition to the general education benefits, finishing this curriculum fulfills the secondary area graduation requirement and awards the *University Honors Scholar* graduation distinction on students' transcripts and diplomas. Please see the Undergraduate Catalog and contact the Honors College for specifics.

4. Can one course be used for multiple categories?

- No double dipping: students cannot use the same course to satisfy two categories (i.e., ANT 100 cannot be used to complete "Individual & Society" and "Global Viewpoints").
- Often courses can be used to fulfill both general education and major or minor requirements. However, several majors and minors do not allow this form of double dipping or have requirements for courses that cannot be used for general education. Please check with an academic advisor.

5. Can two courses from the same discipline be used to satisfy a category requiring multiple classes?

- The Honors College courses (HNR) can be used to fulfill the categories as shown. Within the traditional program (bottom half of this checklist), only one course from any discipline (course prefix) may be used in any of the main categories, as discussed below.
- Three courses from three different disciplines must be taken in "Scientific & Quantitative Inquiry" (one from "Mathematics & Statistics," one "Natural Science with a Lab," and one additional "Natural Science").
- Three courses from three different disciplines must be taken in "Self & Society" (one from "Cultural Pluralism" and two from "Individual & Society").
- Two courses from two different disciplines must be taken from "Culture & Creativity." Note, for this rule, all foreign language courses count as a single discipline. Two foreign language classes cannot be used to fulfill this requirement.

6. Do new general education courses on this checklist count if a student took them last year?

• No, new courses approved as general education for Fall 2018 only fulfill Foundation of Knowledge requirements if taken Fall 2018 or later. These courses are indicated with a † in the checklist.
