Dr. Kyra Shahid, University of Michigan

Dr. Shahid currently serves as the Assistant Director for DEI at University of Michigan's Center for Research on Learning and Teaching and is the founder of Shahid Consulting, LLC. She is a visionary DEI practitioner and educator who specializes in strategic planning and systemic change. Her portfolio of work includes empowering historically disenfranchised groups and universities, creating strategies for retention, promotion and tenure of underrepresented minority faculty and managing culturally restorative projects.

Dr. Greenfield is a nationally recognized thought leader, speaker, and educator with an awardwinning career in academia that has included successful stints as a faculty member (14 years full-time, earning tenure), Vice President for Student Engagement and Campus Life, and two-time Chief Diversity Officer. Rev. Renita Green, University of Dayton

Reverend Green is the Associate Director of Religious Diversity and Ecumenical Ministry at the University of Dayton. Reverend Green served as a Community Pastor and Organizer during the 2014 Ferguson Protest and was featured in the PBS documentary, Ferguson Rises She was also selected by Huffington Post as one of the 2014 People of the Year. Rev. Green is a John Lewis Fellow through the Faith and Politics Institute and is a sought-after expert on bridging the racial divide on campus and in community.

Dr. D-L Stewart, University of Denver

Dr. Stewart is Professor and Chair of the Higher Education Department in the Morgridge College of Education at the University of Denver. His scholarship focuses on the history and philosophy of higher education as well as the institutional systems and structures that affect the experiences, growth, development, and success of racially minoritized and queer and trans* students in historically white postsecondary institutions.
