

President Vaidya, Matt Cecil, and Jeremy Alltop shared the Financial/Budget update for campus. President Vaidya shared that a drop enrollment led to a drop in tuition revenue of approximately \$5mil. Discovered in the summer that institutional aid had been overspent. And there were unbudgeted expenses that needed to be in the base budget of about \$5.7mil. Our focus now is not only at expense, reduction and reallocation but also on institutional aid refinement as well as revenue enhancement that will enable us to have a sustainable path going forward.

Matt Cecil shared that Academic Commons is an idea that originated in the master plan and they decided this was a good time to start pushing that idea forward as part of our next step in our Success by Design. This will be a new way of thinking about student academic support. A team will be put together after the November Board of Regents meeting to consider what might go into Academic Common and figure out the best organizational structure to realize some savings by reducing staff and/or administrative positions to become more nimble. Work from this group will be brought through our collegial governance and get more feedback before moving forward.

Jeremy Alltop shared that positions will be impacted but there are a number of vacancies now so those who are impacted will possibly be able to be moved into the vacant positions. Lori Southwood shared that they were not talking about a large impact on staff and that they were going to minimize the impact the best they can with these vacancies. Steve Slone asked a question that was submitted regarding whether staff would be able to retain their same pay in a new position. Jeremy Alltop responded that It sort of depends, a comparable position would stay the same but if a lower one would the pay range would have to be considered as well as budget of the unit.

Steve Slone asked another question regarding whether the budget was discussed at the September 14<sup>th</sup> Board of Regents meeting. President Vaidya responded that the Board had been apprised of the situation. At the November BOR meeting they will request approval of the revised FY23 budget as well as a request for an additional \$10.4mil. They will also present a much more detailed analysis of the repositioning plan.





Sara Conwell shared another question regarding the discussion of getting rid of NTTR and Adjunct faculty. What will classes look like going forward? Matt Cecil responded that classes will look different. They need to reduce those budgets by \$4.1mil out of the \$22mil budget, about a 20% reduction. The Deans have been given targets for their colleges and they are working with chairs and directors to identify the best way to achieve those savings.

Steve Slone share another question asking why the rush to present to the Board so soon after finding out the problem when it's a three year plan to correct the issue. Why not wait until January? Jeremy Alltop responded by stating that we expect to spend \$18.7mil more than what we're bringing in and that requires Board action to increase our budget. We can't spend more that what the Board has already authorized. President Vaidya stated that we will not balance the budget this year and anticipate it happening over the next couple of years. But we're also making a very strong push to repositioning the institution to the market realities. The market has changed and changed very rapidly. We need to move with some urgency to take advantage of those new market opportunities.

Vicki Cooper asked about the buy out proposal. Jeremy Alltop stated that the specifics are still being worked out and will be on the BOR agenda in November. It's a separation incentive, not a retirement incentive. Tenured and tenure track faculty would be offered a financial incentive to separate their employment. This would reduce the university's costs in the long run.

Steve Slone asked another question about increasing marketing of NKU to help increase enrollment numbers. Eric Gentry responded stating that part of the re position plan includes an increased investment in marketing, admissions, and financial aid.

Steve Slone asked another question regarding EnterpriseNKU. President Vaidya shared that we have actually already launched Enterprise NKU. We didn't' want to lose opportunities in the marketplace by offering some of the professional education and continuing education that this region needs. Academic Affairs and Advancement have worked together to create this idea of creating a "front door" to the campus that allows individual access from the outside.

Steve Slone asked another question about whether the 5 by5 Compensation Plan that recently rolled out and how that plays into the budget deficit. President Vaidya shared that the plan and the investment in our people addressing some of the compression issues that it was the right thing to do. Lori Southwood shared emphasized that the 5 by 5 plan is a five year plan and we're going to review and concentrate on five actions and prioritize our employees and being competitive in the market. What we going to be able to do in each of those years will vary from year to year and from what our budget restraints are.

Sara Conwell shared another question regarding our sustainability and ways we can cut costs. Jeremy Alltop responded and shared that we are in a geopolitical environment and energy prices had escalated rapidly. He said campus will be getting an email from facilities management with suggestions for conservation and ways to save money.

President Vaidya shard that they will be mindful of communication and what to continue to solicit feedback and good input from both the form and from listening sessions. We've navigated bigger challenges and we've done them successfully.
