#### ATTENDANCE AT SATURDAY & SCHOOL MEETINGS

Reminders to start off the school year on the right foot:

- \*Attend School daily
- \*Show up for school meetings since students receive passes and we might not send for you
- \*Keep your grades up—it's easier to be accepted to college and receive scholarships
- \*Attend Saturday meetings. Students may miss two meetings for excused reasons, either illness or a school sponsored activity, and two meetings for unexcused reasons. If students miss more than four meetings, they will not remain in Upward Bound.

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# ACT DATES

All juniors in Kentucky will most likely take the ACT during school the second week of March. **The NKU** code is <u>1566</u> and the NKU Upward Bound code is <u>5877</u>. Please include these on the ACT application so that we get an official copy of your scores and NKU gets an official copy of your scores. If NKU isn't your first choice college, always have it as your back-up choice. These are the national ACT dates and the postmark deadlines for them:

#### <u>National ACT Date</u> <u>Registration Postmark Deadline</u>

October 27 September 28
December 8 November 2
February 9 January 11
April 13 March 8
June 8 May 3
July 13 June 14

We don't recommend taking the ACT more than twice. The only reasons to take it a third time would be to raise a score to take a university credit course, rather than a developmental course, or to raise it to a published scholarship score. In thinking about a third time, students really need to study before taking the ACT.
